A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

In those days Peter stood up among the believers (together the crowd numbered about one hundred twenty persons) and said, "Friends, the scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit through David foretold concerning Judas, who became a guide for those who arrested Jesus—for he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry. LATEST FINANCIAL NEWS: For the month of March, St. Peter's had **revenue** of \$167,297, which was \$13,857 above plan and **expenses** of \$144,753, which were \$9,535 above plan.

Year to date REVENUE:

Pledges of \$244,720 were \$34,720 above budget. Pledges-prior year were \$16,010 and were not budgeted. Gifts of Record received of \$21,797 were \$6,603 below budget. Lenten Offerings of \$972 were \$228 below budget and Easter Offerings received so far were \$4,789. Rectory Lease Income was below budget but new renters moved into the rectory in late March and rent will be received in April. The Thrift Shop was 16% above plan. During March, Outreach Direct Donations collected \$2,680 for Camp Stevens through giving jar and designated fund contributions.

MAY OUTREACH FOCUS: This month we support the work of RefugeeNet San Diego. For over 20 years they have equipped refugee families to be self-reliant, engaged, and contributing citizens by providing academic support to kids and coordinating with community schools. They help families by organizing weekly food distribution and offering case management and job development service. This summer RefugeeNet is participating in a Drowning Prevention Program. HIGH SCHOOL SUMMER TRIP: This summer, youth from the Episcopal Diocese of San Diego will travel to the Community of Light in Tijuana. They will meet youth from the Anglican Diocese of Western Mexico. The Community is a partnership between the two dioceses and will be a shelter for women and children building a life in Tijuana after being unable to cross into the US. Youth on this trip will build relationships with the youth from Western Mexico, learn about the culture in Mexico, work on service projects for the shelter, and deepen their faith through learning, serving, and worship. Applications are open through May 20, 2024. There are 15 spots for this year's trip. The cost is \$500 and a valid US passport is required. If a student is selected for the delegation, they will secure their spot by making a \$50 deposit. The diocese will fundraise in the community to make the trip possible for every student who wants to go. Those who participate in the fundraisers are eligible for a share of the funds raised. Any balance remaining as of July 20, 2024, is the responsibility of the student. Trip runs August 2-8, 2024 for students entering grade 10 – exiting grade 12. CONGRATULATIONS EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF SAN DIEGO! Forty "Becoming Beloved Community" grants supporting the work of racial justice, healing, reconciliation, and creation care were approved by The Episcopal Church's Executive Council during its April meeting. The grants total \$226,930. Our diocese was awarded a \$6,375.00 Seed Grant for its Racial Justice and Reconciliation Task Force. Seed grants are geared toward groups launching new projects or growing existing projects. Our own Hanh Tran served as one of the Grant Reviewers for the "Becoming Beloved Community" and said, "It is such joy to know that EDSD racial justice work bears its fruit for God's glory." We bless and thank Hanh for her service to our diocese and the larger Church in this capacity.

EPISCOPAL NEWS SERVICE – Ascension Day: The Feast of the Ascension of Jesus Christ is celebrated 40 days after Easter Day, marking the conclusion of Jesus' post-resurrection appearances and his ascension into heaven. This year, Ascension Day fell last Thursday, May 9. Celebration of this holy day dates back at least to the late fourth century, and scriptural references to Jesus' ascension occur in both The Acts of the Apostles and the Gospel of Mark (Acts 1: 6-11; (Mark 16:1. 9).
